station. There was an admirable turnout with some very tasty vehicles on display;




"Tom's Field" Bank Holiday Monday

August Mystery Car John Bishop

L'Eclair- 1930

Built by Jean Legeay of Gennes, France, the L'Éclair is a home-built propeller-driven car. Built in M Legeay's garage, he made every part, except the Indian V-twin engine, the wheels, and the gauges. He even carved the propeller himself! The name L'Éclair shares its meaning with the pastry; éclair in French means "flash of light". It was said you ate the dessert as fast as a bolt of lightning. M Legeay also used the car from 1930 until 1935, making many improvements. He said the car ran very well, had smooth acceleration, and was faster than anything else of the time. The drawback was the noise; it scared people, and it was said he would also chop up many chickens that ran across the road in front of him. In 1935, he gave up on the L'Éclair to pursue other business interests.

We got back from France in early August and decided to take advantage of an offer to use my Aunt's Holiday house on Lock Sween. We decided to use the MG3 as we had put a lot of miles on the Honda this year. Off we set, packed up with gear heading for a Travel Lodge in Burton. Nancy and I shared the driving doing shifts. As we started the M6 stretch, we hit rain and as is customary the MG3 automatically swept the screen keeping a clear view ahead. As we munched the miles, disaster was about to strike..... the driver's side wiper came loose on the spindle and got entwined with the other wiper!!! Luckily we were just by a services and popped in to sort out the problem. I eventually found a kind trucker man who had a 13mm socket and off we went again.

We endured the family room experience overnight and Nancy took the first shift at the wheel. We were minutes into our journey when the temperature red light came on and quite soon started to bing and bong at us. We pulled into the next services and following the guidance in the handbook topped up the rather low expansion tank. This all took thirty or so minutes, after various children decided that they needed the loo etc etc. So with fingers crossed I took the wheel and we headed back on to the M6. What happened next worried me, the red light came on then went off, came on, then went off and finally stayed on.... So we stopped again.

I couldn't open the radiator as it was red hot and the expansion tank still seemed ok - did we just have an airlock from earlier? We all went to the loo again and Nancy had a walk round the shop and we tried again. Ten minutes later though the

light was back on and I started to worry about head gaskets etc so we stopped again and I called the RAC.

An hour and a bit later a really excellent RAC chap turned up and by this time the radiator had cooled enough to open - he put rather a surprising amount of water straight in and then pressure tested the system. He found no leak.... He drove with us up to the next service station and all seemed fine so we headed on 'up North'

We went through Glasgow and a further two hours off 'logging truck' windy Loch roads until finally arrived at my Aunt's house. We had made it! Whilst we were up there I brimmed the radiator every morning and decided to stop at Solihull to see my brother on the way home. The return journey went smoothly, despite our nerves. I booked the car into the MG garage to get it properly checked. To start with they could find no problem. In the end they found there was a leak in the lid part of the expansion tank (£12) and it was duly fixed.

Nancy drove me up to the MG garage at Wickwar to collect the car and as I went into the Service office to sort the paperwork etc she went into the showroom and before I knew it she was putting a deposit down on a Blue ZS (not one like Kevin's! - The New Compact SUV). Well I wasn't going to argue with that! The thing is she had lost confidence in the car, what with the Deer incident and then all this she needed to move on... so we did.
