You may recall in a previous article I had restored a Mini Moulton that once was my mother-in-law's, well word got out and my aunt said she had a Moulton that had been in one of her sheds very neglected for many years, and would I try to bring it back to life. As you will see from the photos this MK3 model was in a bit of a state.



A little bit of history for you. When Alex

Moulton first designed the Moulton his plan was to sell his idea to a bicycle producer i.e. Raleigh cycles. To his surprise he was all but laughed out of their offices, so he decided to produce the bike himself. As we know it became very popular, so much so that Raleigh tried copying the idea and came out with their Raleigh shopper but instead of suspension like the Moulton had, they put large balloon tyres to give it some bounce. No surprise, it never really competed against Alex Moulton's design, so cap in hand Raleigh went to Moulton to try and buy the rights to produce his bike, they were successful in their bid and that was the start of the MK 3 model albeit a slight paired down version. At the same time Raleigh launched the Chopper which became so successful they were short on production space, this enabled Moulton to buy back the rights at a bargain price.

Despite the condition, my aunt's bike was all there, including the bag. It only needed a bit of TLC, some new tyres, brake cables, stickers and respray. As my aunt wanted to keep costs down, I just tidied up the chrome and re-plated some parts at home with









zinc, which when polished looks quite decent. The paintwork was competed with a few Halford's spray cans of Ford Diamond White.

Sue and I enjoyed a little ride round on both Moultons and took them over to the factory in Bradford on Avon for a photo shoot. The MK3 was returned to a very happy aunt, who is now storing it in her daughter's garage (warm and dry).

# CARRIAGES AT THREE

PROVISIONS LIST - HAVE IT DELIVERED

3 lbs BEETROOT (COOKED AND SLICED)

2 LARGE ONIONS

11/2 lbs COOKING APPLES

1 PINT MALT VINEGAR - 1/2 tsp GINGER - JUICE OF ONE LEMON

1/2 lb DEMERARA SUGAR

Take a large saucepan - the one you usually use for a large haunch of venison will do nicely. Toss the pan on the AGA, and add the apple, onions, vinegar, ginger, lemon juice and sugar. Boil for about the time it takes to have a couple of good glasses of wine - 20 minutes.

Add the sliced beetroot and bring to the boil again, you may as well finish the bottle - another 20 minutes.

Settle in the summer house and have a snooze whilst the chutney cools and then simply decant into any old crystal jars you have hanging around and cover.

An excellent accompaniment to all game, pheasant, grouse, swan etc.
