You may have picked up in some of the motoring publications that the results of two major surveys have recently been released emphasising the vast contribution that classic cars make to the UK economy. A classic car being over 30 years old. Both reports illustrate that the power of the historic vehicle movement should not be underestimated, with its value to the UK economy outweighing both the equestrian hobby and the Scotch whisky industry.

One of the reports came from the Federation of British Historic Vehicle clubs (FBHVC). Headline figures are that the number of historic vehicles has increased to 1.5 million and that the industry that supports them involves 4,000 businesses employing almost 35,000 people. As with anything relating to the car industry today, the environmental issues are addressed. The report emphasised that 56% of historic vehicles are on SORN, and that with each historic vehicle covering an average of 1200 miles a year, they account for less than 0.2% of the total miles driven in the UK.

The most popular margues are Ford, Land Rover, MG, Austin, VW and Triumph. The FBHVC results are used in Parliament and elsewhere to protect the freedom of owners to use their vehicles as they like and without restrictions.

4000 businesses in the historic vehicle sector, employing more than 34,000 people

The second survey was commissioned by HERO-ERA the Historic Rallying Endurance Organisation from the Centre for Economic and Business Research. It focussed more on the economic and environmental impact of classic cars. It estimated the turnover of the industry was £18.3 Billion and provides more than 113,000 jobs by 'chain spread' across the UK including 665 young people apprenticed directly into the industry. The report estimated the UK's stock of historic vehicles to be worth £12.6 billion, it also said that consumer expenditure in classic cars is more environmentally friendly than other pursuits because in essence its recycling. The stats supporting that go something like this. The average £1000 spent on using classic cars and related industries creates 80kg of CO2 equivalent emissions taking everything into account. This compares with 537kg of CO2 that would result from the average £1000 of consumer expenditure. By way of comparison, the average spend on classics is 98% more environmentally friendly than flying to the Far East. In breaking classics down into sectors, it shows that Historic racing contributes £371 million a year, owners' clubs £111 million, historic rallying £253 million, museums £62 million and specialist magazines £59 million.

As far as the latter stat is concerned, judging by the number of magazines that drop through our letter box, I am a major contributor!

Having said that, it was a good morning out with over 200 cars and quite a few to drool over.





In Tom's scribbles this month, he is tempted by the trend to convert conventional headlights to the LED type. This topic was aired in the Miscellany - the Morgan Sports Car Club's monthly magazine. Personally I'm not a fan, in my view they look incongruous on classic cars, but hey....

Now the thing is if you fitted this type of headlight anytime up to this year you were fine, but for 2021 the MOT rules it seems have changed. It now appears since the 11th January the conversion to LED bulbs and HID ones is banned if they have been fitted in lenses designed for halogen bulbs. In future to pass the MOT test with LED lights, you would need to change the whole unit.

The change to the MOT rule on headlights is as follows:

4.1.4 Headlamps - Compliance with requirements - Existing halogen headlamp units should not be converted to be used with high intensity discharge (HID) or light emitting diode (LED) bulbs. if such a conversion has been done, you must fail the headlamp.
